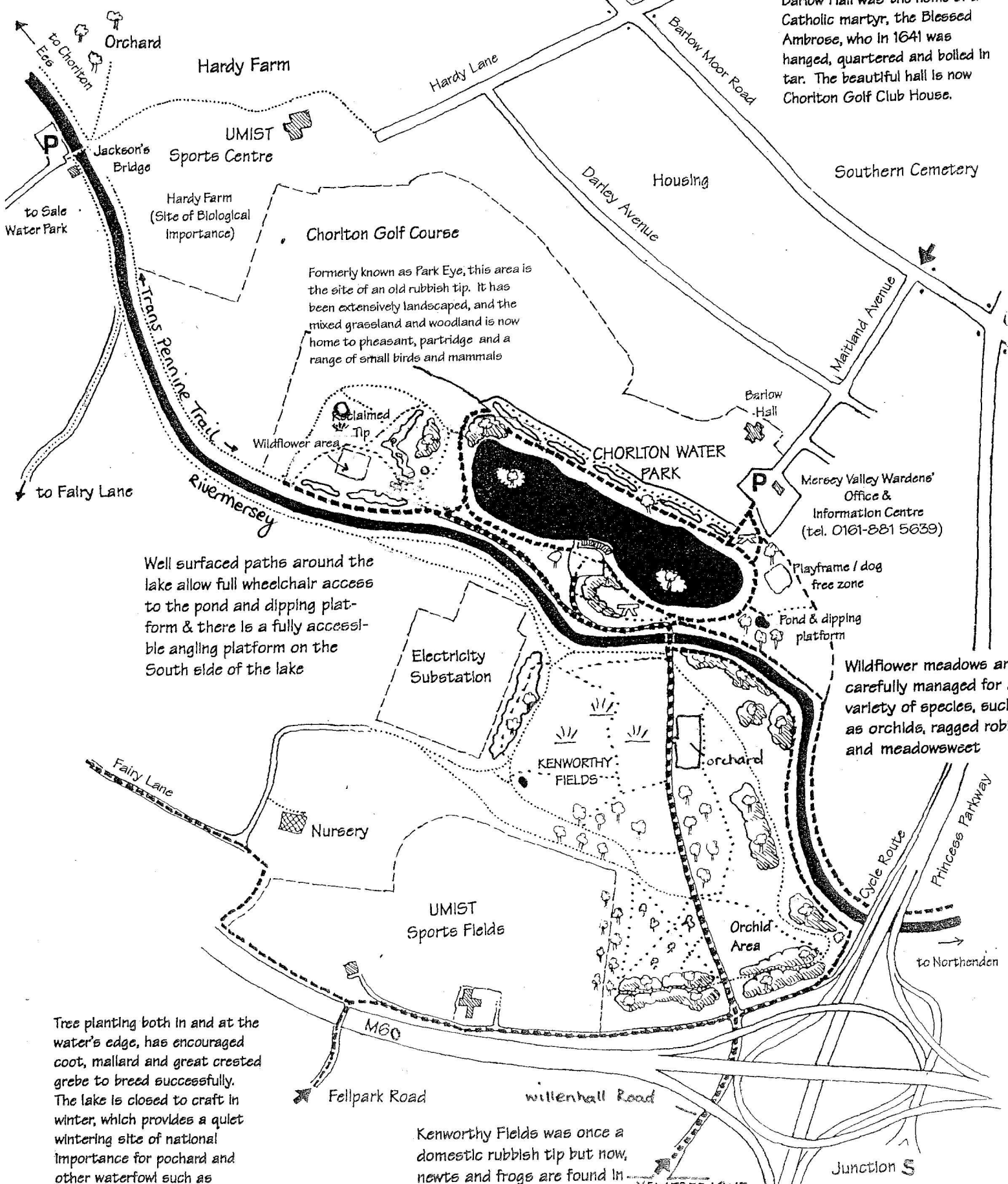


areas of interest CHORLTON WATER PARK

Barlow Hall was the home of a Catholic martyr, the Blessed Ambrose, who in 1641 was hanged, quartered and boiled in tar. The beautiful hall is now Chorlton Golf Club House.



Chorlton Golf Course
Formerly known as Park Eye, this area is the site of an old rubbish tip. It has been extensively landscaped, and the mixed grassland and woodland is now home to pheasant, partridge and a range of small birds and mammals

Well surfaced paths around the lake allow full wheelchair access to the pond and dipping platform & there is a fully accessible angling platform on the South side of the lake

Wildflower meadows are carefully managed for a variety of species, such as orchids, ragged rob and meadowsweet

Tree planting both in and at the water's edge, has encouraged coot, mallard and great crested grebe to breed successfully. The lake is closed to craft in winter, which provides a quiet wintering site of national importance for pochard and other waterfowl such as goldeneye and tufted duck

Kenworthy Fields was once a domestic rubbish tip but now, newts and frogs are found in the wet areas, as well as the beautiful Northern Marsh Orchid
